Possible Implications of Withdrawing from a Course

When considering withdrawing from a course, it is important to understand how doing so may impact you academically and/or financially.

Housing – GW Housing requires all students living on campus to be registered for a minimum of 12 credits, or full-time status. If you are registered for a relatively low number of credits and live in oncampus housing, withdrawing from a course could put you below full-time status, which violates the terms and conditions of the Housing License Agreement. • Financial Aid/Scholarships — If you were awarded federal aid or scholarship aid, there are certain criteria you must meet, which may involve staying registered as a full-time student (at least 12 credits). If you are registered for a relatively low number of credits and receive financial aid, withdrawing from a course could put you below full-time status. This could affect your financial aid eligibility. For more information, contact the Office of Student Financial Assistance. Note that withdrawals after the specified refund period will not result in a refund of tuition and/or fees.
